Mrs Campbell – HLTA and Inclusion Support

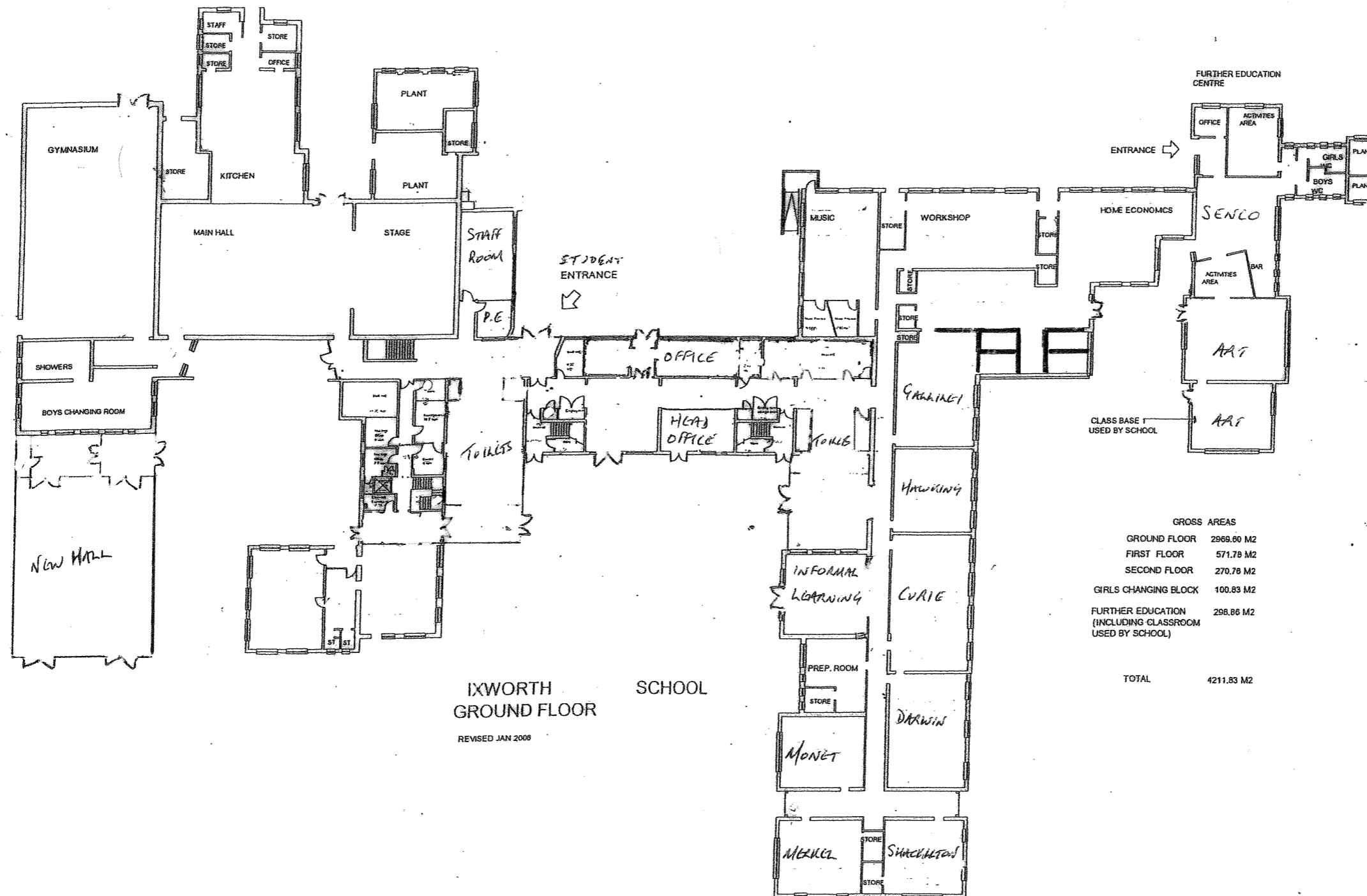
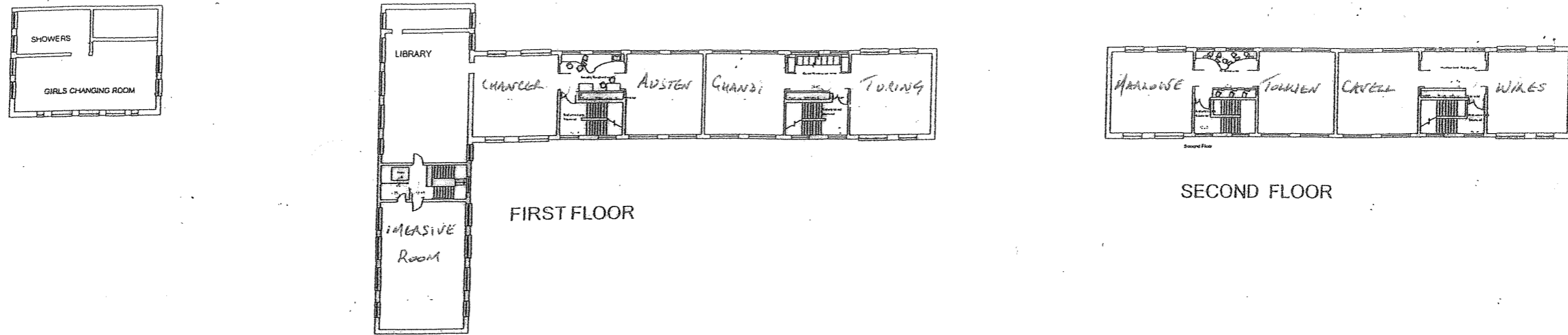

Frequently Asked Questions



1. How will I meet my tutor if School is closed until the summer break?

On Wednesday 10 June, we will hold a meet the tutor event. If the School remains closed, this will be organised as an online live event where you can meet your tutors as well as other key members of staff.

2. What happens if School remains closed until summer?

If the School remains closed, you will still get all the information you need via the internet or post. You will also get a chance to see the School at least once.

3. Will I get to meet anyone in my year before I start?

We are working on a way to connect you with your future classmates via Google Classroom. This will be set up by May half term. Through Google Classroom, you will be able to introduce yourself and chat with other students in your tutor group.

4. What is a form tutor?

A tutor is a member of staff whose job it is to take care of their tutor group. You will be in a tutor group with around 24 students and you will have a Year 7 form tutor to make sure you are ready to succeed at School. They are the person your parent contacts if they need any information or help.

5. How long is the School day?

The School day begins at 8.30am but most people arrive around 8.00am to get some breakfast; the day ends at 3.55pm.

6. What will my first day be like at SET Ixworth School?

On your first day, you will be met as you arrive and will immediately be in the care of teachers and our older students. They will make sure you get some breakfast and know where you are going. Following on from that, you will go to your tutor's classroom to get to know them, find out any information you need and to get your timetable. After a few hours, your lessons will start and your secondary School experience begins.

7. How will I find my way around School?

For the first few days of School, you will be shown around the School by some older students who have the job of making sure you know where to go! It's quite easy to learn your way around once you've been here a couple of days.

8. Will I need my PE kit on the first day?

Yes. You will receive your timetable on the first day and our PE staff like to start teaching you straight away so please make sure you have your PE kit with you. Once you have your timetable, you will just need to bring it on the days you have PE.

9. Will I get a locker?

Yes, you will get a locker come September. This will be big enough to store your coat, bag and PE kit.

10. What if I forget something?

Although our expectations are very high, we do know that this is a big step. For the first few weeks, our teachers will understand that it takes time to adjust. If you do forget something important, please talk to staff and we can often help.

11. Am I allowed my mobile phone?

We understand that students will have their phones with them but they are to be switched off and remain in your bag throughout the School day. They may only be used before and after School but never on the school site.

12. Will I get a lot of homework?

You will get weekly homework in English, Maths, Science and MFL (languages). You will also get an extended project once a half term which will be a project covering multiple topics.

13. Are there extra-curricular clubs?

Over the first few weeks of secondary School, you will be told about our extra-curricular opportunities and how to sign up to these. Some examples are: DT workshop, Music lessons, Sports clubs.

14. When and what can I eat?

You can get food and drink three times throughout the School day:

- Before School: Breakfast (toast, fruit, squash and cereal)
- Break: Breakfast (toast, soup, fruit, squash and cereal)
- Lunch: A rotating menu of hot food including options for anyone with dietary requirements as well as a fantastic salad bar.



Looking Ahead

We still have many exciting steps in your transition process and these include:

1. Finding out who your tutor is via our live online "meet the tutor" event.
2. If the School remains closed between now and the summer, we will create an online classroom so you can meet your new classmates.
3. A visit to the School in the near future and before you start in September.
